4. ASSESSMENT

Oral examination:

Oral examination in English, aimed to verify the level of acquisition and personal reinterpretation of the cultural and literary topics presented during the course.

4. ASSESSMENT

One/two questions will focus on the Civilization part, the others on the Literary syllabus. Students can practise the literary part of the oral exam using the file "Literature – questions for the exam" on the e-learning platform.

Besides the level of familiarity with the topics in the syllabus, pronunciation and linguistic accuracy are further assessment criteria. The pass grade is 18/30.

4. ASSESSMENT FOR STUDENTS WHO ATTEND CLASSES

Final course test on the Civilization part (optional):

The written test will take place in person or on Moodle

It will consist of 20 multiple choice questions on the Civilization part to be completed in 50 minutes. On Moodle, on the written test page, students will find a practice test as well.
